Delawnte Hardy indicted for murder of Cleveland police officer, Garfield Heights grandmother

Cuyahoga County Prosecutor Michael C. O'Malley announced last week that a Cuyahoga County grand jury has returned an indictment charging Delawnte Hardy, 24, for the aggravated murder of Cleveland Police Officer Jamieson Ritter in Cleveland and the aggravated murder of Hardy's grandmother, Beatrice Porter, in Garfield Heights.

"In the course of a week, Delawnte Hardy caused unimaginable damage and grief to two families, our law enforcement community and our entire region," said O'Malley. "My office will walk step by step with these two families to ensure justice is served. My thoughts and prayers remain with those grieving from this tragic situation."

On June 28, 2024, Hardy was staying with his 63-year-old grandmother, Beatrice Porter, at her residence near Reindeer Ave. and Claremont Blvd., in Garfield Heights. While inside her residence, he stole her firearm and shot her in the back of the head, according to prosecutors. Afterward, he fled the scene on his grandfather's bicycle.

A family member arrived at the residence the next morning around 1 a.m., found the victim and called the police. The Garfield Heights Police Department and EMS responded and transported Porter to a nearby hospital. A felonious assault warrant was issued for Hardy's

arrest that same day. On July 4, 2024, around 12 p.m., Porter was pronounced deceased.

On July 4, 2024, around 1 a.m., the Cleveland Division of Police (CDP) responded to a call stating that Hardy was at a residence near E. 80 St. and Wade Park Ave. in Cleveland. CDP officers arrived on the scene and placed a spotlight on the residence. During the next couple minutes, police said Officer Ritter instructed Hardy six times over a loudspeaker to exit the residence out the front door with his hands up. Hardy then began to flee out the back door of the residence on his grandfather's bicycle with two swords and the firearm he stole from his grandmother.

As Hardy rode away, several officers attempted to arrest him. During the struggle, police said, Hardy fired four shots at multiple officers. The first shot struck Officer Ritter, the second shot nearly missed another officer, and the third shot was in the direction of two other officers. CDP officers began providing lifesaving aid to Officer Ritter. He was transported to a nearby hospital, where he was later pronounced deceased. Hardy was arrested and taken into custody.

On July 10, 2024, Delawnte Hardy was indicted on the following charges: Three counts of aggravated murder, two counts of attempted aggravated murder, one count of murder, four counts of felonious assault, two counts of aggravated robbery, two counts of receiving stolen property, one count of having weapons while under disability, one count of theft, one count of resisting arrest and one count of misdemeanor theft.

Pride Month legislation defeated on 3rd reading in Maple Heights

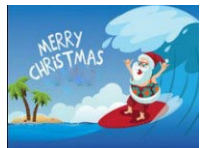
A resolution recognizing the month of June as "LGBTQ+ Pride Month" in the city of Maple Heights failed to pass on its third and final reading at the city council meeting held Wednesday, July 3. The legislation also failed to pass on its first two readings at May and June council meetings.

Besides District 2 Councilwoman Toni Jones, who first sponsored the bill, two other council members voted yes to adopt the legislation: Timothy Tatum of District 3 and Dana Anderson of District 4. Council members voting against were Tanglyn Madden of District 5 and Edwina Agee of District 7. Abstaining from the vote were Stafford Shennett of District 1 and Tina Stafford-Marbury of District 6. Because a simple majority of four out of seven affirmative votes was needed to pass, the legislation failed, Council Clerk Leonette Cicirella Johnson stated.

Pride Month legislation defeated on third reading in Maple Heights

Stafford-Marbury said that council members had discussed having more education on the LGBTQ+ community in the city "and none of that was done... We talked about the community members we have here in Maple Heights, and as I indicated at the last meeting, there was nothing done."

She added that she had spoken with members of the LGBTQ+ community, "And what I am getting from that community is that they live their lives and they go to work and go for entertainment, and when they come home, they want to be peaceful."

Agee suggested that more information on the legislation should have been made available to council members and that it should have been introduced earlier in the year before June, to allow council more time to learn about it and consider it.

Mayor Annette Blackwell responded that she had been getting numerous phone calls from the LGBTQ+ community regarding the legislation and she's been flooded with questions.

"I don't get a vote because I'm not a legislator," Blackwell said, "but if I had a vote, I would vote for this. Perhaps next year there is a collaboration among you and you can present legislation that's not missing anything, that we can vote for and acknowledge this, like we do for so many other months."

Council President Ron Jackson stated, "Coming from a category, that being of color, that has been through the years discriminated against and held back, it's hard for

me not to want to see this pass... I don't have to agree with the lifestyle, but I would say that I agree with (the LGBTQ+ community) being recognized. And through this resolution, it would be just a small step to recognize that group of people."

Sale of 15 parcels for new houses approved

Council passed a resolution authorizing Blackwell to enter into an agreement to sell 15 vacant, city-owned lots through its Land Bank to GLH LLC, for a total amount of \$37,501, for the construction and sale of a single family, owner-occupied home on each property.

The legislation states that GLH will build a home on each property within three years after the effective date of the agreement, with the following minimum improvements: the homes must be an owner-occupied single family and have at least three bedrooms, two baths and two off-street parking spaces, one of which must be a totally enclosed attached garage.

The vacant lots involved are three single lots on Carol Drive in District 1; 14501 Kennerdown Ave. and 15012 Krems Ave. in District 3; single lot on Arch St., single lot on Philip St., 5218 Erwin, 5171 Cato and 5152 Cato in District 4; 17703 Maple Heights Blvd., single lot on Cato St., 5615 South Blvd., 17204 Maple Heights Blvd. in District 5; and 5349 South Blvd. in District 7.

Other legislation approved

- Resolution authorizing contract with Philips Paving for the Longvale and Woodbrook Avenue Resurfacing Project, at a cost of \$573,225. The city has received funding from the Northeast Ohio Sewer District (NEORS) and the Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) towards the project, which follows sewer repair work in the area.

- Resolution authorizing contract with Fabrizi Trucking for the NEORS Southwest Quadrant Sewer Repairs Phase 2 Project, at a cost not to exceed \$1,717,717. The NEORS, the OPWC, the Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works, the Ohio EPA, and the Ohio Water Development Authority are all involved in funding and loans towards the project, which will encompass repairs to storm and sanitary sewers on Dunham, Turney, Carol, Summit, Rochelle, Lisa, Janet, James, Wheeler, E. 146,

Mustang, and Thunderbird streets and adjacent easement areas.

- Resolution authorizing contract with Cole Burton Contractors, LLC, for the Lee Road Resurfacing Project, at a cost of \$363,405. Cuyahoga County will contribute 50% of the actual cost of construction determined eligible by the county Engineers' Office, up to a maximum of \$250,000, the legislation states.

- Ordinance amending the codified ordinances, requiring council approval for "any city monies expended or allocated over \$5,000 for the refurbishing of city buildings and offices and for the purchase of office furniture, decorations and amenities." The ordinances require that council must approve all expenditures over \$25,000 "excluding regular employee benefits and expenditures which have not already been authorized by contract or ordinance." Council recommended the stated exception to the \$25,000 spending limit for refurbishing and furniture, according to the legislation.

- Resolution authorizing Blackwell and Service Director Tony Ciresi to enter into a contract with AW Farrel for the Fire Station No. 1 Roof Repair Project, at a cost not to exceed \$470,000. The cost will be covered by \$480,000 in funding which the city was awarded from the Cuyahoga County Council District 8 American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Community Grant Fund. Blackwell credited County Councilman Pernel Jones, Jr. for his role in distributing the ARPA funding to the city for the repairs.

- Resolution authorizing use of public funds and resources and the acceptance of private donations for the following 2024 community events: Hoop-It-Up Bridge the Gap; Trunk-Or-Treat; District Block Parties; and District Clean-Up Days.

Shenett honors tournament winner

Shenett honored city resident Melvin Williams, 17, during a special presentation at the meeting. Williams was recognized for his participation in the Annual Bridge the Gap Hoop It Up tournament, where his team won the varsity championship, Shenett stated.

"The Bridge the Gap campaign is an annual event we do in collaboration with the Maple Heights Police Department. It's another tool we use to build unity in the community," Shenett added.

At a special June 3, 2024 council meeting, Kevin James was reappointed to the Maple Heights Planning and Zoning Commission for the term ending May 31, 2029.

Announcements

Police Chief Todd Hansen announced that four juveniles arrested in the recent assault of a minor in the city were being prosecuted for felony level crimes and had been sent to Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court.

Human Services Director Linda Vopat said the City Wide Garage Sale will be held on August 15-18 this year. Participants will pay \$5 per house, the city will do all the advertising and no permits will be needed for those days.

Criminal Damage-Residence

On July 4, at 10:40 p.m., an officer responded to an apartment at Jennings Manor, 10200 Granger Rd., where a female victim said that day, about 9:20 p.m., she was sitting on her couch in her living room watching TV and hearing fireworks being set off outside when she also heard what sounded like gunshots coming from outside her window. She got up to investigate and saw a small bullet hole in her wall, next to her living room window. She was not struck by the bullet but it did damage the wall. The spent round could not be located. The officer did locate a small entry bullet hole on the outside wall panel of the apartment.

On July 5, at about 11:35 a.m., an officer responded to an apartment in the 10300 block of Granger Rd., for a shooting into a residence. The apartment manager said the apartment was damaged from a stray bullet. The resident said that at about 9 p.m. the night before she went to bed and saw no drywall damage in her living room. But on getting up at 5:30 a.m. the next morning, she saw what appeared to be a bullet hole in her living room wall. Police found that the bullet had then entered a kitchen wall. A similar report about the same time was located for a nearby apartment and appears to be likely both incidents stemmed from the same discharging of a firearm in the area east of the apartment buildings.

Animal Complaint

On July 5, at 4:09 p.m., police were dispatched to the 4300 block of MLK, Jr. Dr., for a resident who shot his rifle at a vicious pitbull. The complainant advised that he had just got home from a trip when he found a stray dog between his garage and his house barking at him. He fired a warning shot to the ground to scare the dog from possibly attacking his wife. Due to the dog showing aggression at the complainant

and his wife, officers requested the animal warden remove it from the premises. The report will be forwarded to the Law Department for review.

Theft from Auto

On July 8, an officer was met at the station by a woman wishing to file a theft report. She said that while at Trinity High School playing bingo the day before, someone had entered her vehicle and stolen her wallet. It was located near Marymount Villa by a man who turned it in at the station. She was notified and had come to the station to pick it up. She said the only thing missing was a credit union debit card. The credit union had notified the woman that someone had attempted to use the card.

Suspicious Vehicle

On July 9, at about 3:35 p.m., officers were dispatched to the parking lot of the Garfield Heights Police Department for a male drinking alcohol in a black Nissan with a temporary tag. Police found the vehicle right in front of the court entrance in the rear parking lot. A black male was standing outside of the car on the driver's side. Officers found an open container of Smirnoff alcoholic beverage in the cup holder in the front seat area. The male said it was his drink. He was given a summons to appear in court on open container violation and released.

Animal Cruelty

On July 12, at about 4:30 p.m., police responded to the 8200 block of Garfield Blvd., to check on the welfare of a dog. As they walked to the backyard of the residence, a dog appeared from behind the neighbor's house. It was a large pit/boxer breed. It began growling and ran towards one of the officers, who sprayed it with pepper spray and it ran into the backyard. A witness said the owner of the dog doesn't care for it and it is always outside. She said she saw the dog eating a dead animal earlier in the day. Police spoke with the dog's owner, who said she does not want the dog anymore and asked if the police department could take it. The animal warden came and captured the dog and transported it to the kennels. The woman was issued a citation for animal at large.

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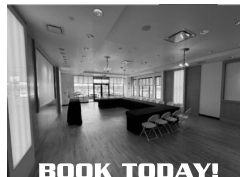

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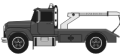

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CLE City Council creates Parks & Rec Department

Cleveland City Council held its first of two summer meetings on Wednesday, July 10, and created a new, stand-alone Department of Parks & Recreation.

Council approved eliminating the division of Recreation and Park Maintenance and Properties and the Office of Special Events and Marketing from the Department of Public Works and instead created a Department of Parks & Recreation.

This new Department of Parks & Recreation will be responsible for all the equipment and other property belonging to the city and relating to the Department of Parks & Recreation, as well the management of Public Hall, Music Hall, Little Theater, main arena, Malls B and C, and all of the Public Auditorium, West Side Market, golf course, and Cleveland Browns Stadium.

The new department will oversee all city parks and all recreation facilities. The new Department of Parks & Recreation will also house the Office of Special Events and Marketing, overseeing planning and permitting for special events including the filming of movies or television shows.

Forestry Becomes its Own Separate Division: Council members Jenny Spencer and Charles Slife sponsored an amendment to establish a Division of Urban Forestry that would be housed under the new Department of Parks & Recreation. The council members noted that having a division will enable the city to be more transparent and intentional about enhancing the tree canopy, as well as dealing with other issues including tree maintenance, installations and sidewalk repair because of tree roots. The establishment of the new division comes at an opportune time with the city announcing a \$3.4 million award from the USDA Forest Service Urban and Community Forestry Program through the federal Inflation Reduction Act.

Capital Improvement Projects and Equipment Purchases: Several pieces of capital improvements legislation were passed, and council authorized the issuance and sale of not to exceed \$67,500,000 of Series 2024

Various Purpose General Obligation Bonds to pay for the improvements and purchases.

The bond funding is going for: \$1.25 million for cemetery improvements; \$11 million to acquire heavy duty trucks and equipment including snow plows, bucket trucks and garbage trucks; \$5 million to acquire light duty vehicles and equipment; \$9.25 million for Parks & Recreation improvements; \$15 million for public facilities improvements; \$26 million for roads and bridge improvements.

Restoring the Vacant Variety Theater: Council approved a \$100,000 grant agreement with Variety Properties, LLC to provide economic development assistance to partially finance costs associated with renovating the vacant Variety Theater building, located at 11801-11825 Lorain Avenue.
