Metroparks to sponsor 'BIG Squish' to help get rid of spotted lanternfly Mayor Matt Burke says Lee Boyas to seek \$30 million state grant for Transportation Boulevard extension

At the regular meeting of Garfield Heights Council Monday night, Mayor Matt Burke announced that at a recent meeting with Lee Boyas, owner of Boyas Excavating, he learned Boyas plans to apply to the All Ohio Future Fund for a state grant of \$30 million to finally see Transportation Blvd. extended to Rockside Rd.

For decades Garfield Heights mayors have talked about the need for the extension of Transportation Blvd. to further growth in the city and easier access to its businesses. "My dad always wanted this road to go through," Boyas told Burke, "and I want to get this done because that's what Dad wanted."

Burke said that as soon as Boyas files the application the city will work with state, county and local leaders to do everything in their power to make that road happen.

The mayor said that even if the All Ohio Future Fund grant doesn't materialize, there are other state funds to pursue and he will be leading the charge.

"This is huge, huge for the city of Garfield Heights," Burke said at the council meeting.

In his Mayor's Report, he also pointed out that the city's Exterior Home Repair Grant money has run out, with 90 residents qualifying and 66 actually getting the grants. Burke said he will work to get funds in place so that the program can be renewed for next year.

GoFundMe account opened in support of Red Chimney restaurant workers

In the wake of the devastating fire last week that left the Red Chimney restaurant on Fleet Ave. in Slavic Village, closed for the foreseeable future, Earl Pike, former director of University Settlement, has started a GoFundMe account to support Red Chimney employees who don't know when they'll be going back to work.

The following is Pike's Facebook posting urging those who are able to contribute.

"There may be a number of GoFundMe campaigns to support the Red Chimney, but this one is coming from Pete and Lou, the whole family, and all the workers.

"The fire at the Red Chimney restaurant in Slavic Village was devastating for a host of reasons. The physical damage was extensive, and is likely to take some time to fix — not days, or weeks, but months. But on a deeper level our community lost, at least for a while, a community institution — a gathering place, a good spot to pick up neighborhood gossip or meet a friend, a reliable source of good, healthy, inexpensive meals, a place where they know your name, and you know theirs.

"The other loss, of course, is for the family and workers, and that's the sole focus of this GoFundMe campaign.

"There were 17 workers at the Red Chimney when the fire started 6 days ago. Most of those workers, like folks around here, made just living wages (or survived on tips). Unemployment will help for some, but as everyone knows, unemployment only covers a certain percentage of your previous income. In addition, unemployment won't help the wait staff who relied on tips.

"So this appeal is simple, and comes from the family: they need your help covering living expenses for perhaps as long as six months.

"Let's do this. I know most of the folks there and they are wonderful people, people who have come in every day to serve and support our community. Let's serve and support them."

Help Cleveland Metroparks stop the invasion of the spotted lanternfly (SLF) by joining The BIG Squish on Saturday, Aug. 23, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon at three Metroparks locations: Garfield Park Reservation-meet at Garfield Park Program Center, Merwin's Wharf and Wendy Park.

Bring the whole family for a fun, hands-on event where you'll learn to spot spotted lanternfly egg masses, nymphs and adults and, guided by a Metroparks naturalist, help squash them on the spot!

"Together we can stop the spread and preserve the health of our forests," said Metroparks officials.

The spotted lanternfly is an invasive pest that is capable of damaging certain plants such as grapevines, black walnut saplings and tree-of-heaven. SLF was first identified in Ohio in 2020, and has since been found in several counties across the state with quarantines initiated in Cuyahoga, Franklin, Hamilton and Lucas counties.

Although SLF cannot bite or sting, both nymphs and adults often jump when approached. Slow the spread of SLF by checking your vehicle and any outdoor equipment and firewood when going in and out of a quarantined county.

Manage SLF on your property by removing host plants, destroying eggs, and using chemical control when appropriate.

SLF damage is caused by the insect feeding on the trunk and branches of woody plants. Nymphs feed on a wide range of plants, sucking sap from young stems and branches. Adults tend to focus feeding on tree of heaven and grapevines. The feeding can result in oozing sap, wilting, leaf curling and dieback.

Man fatally shot in Giant Eagle parking lot in Maple Hts. last Saturday afternoon

A 28-year-old man loading his car with groceries in the parking lot of Giant Eagle, 5321 Warrensville Center Rd., Maple Heights, was shot in the chest Saturday, Aug. 8, about 1:40 p.m., and died from his injuries the next day, according to Maple Heights police.

The victim, Timothy Kappenhagen, died at 6:53 a.m., Sunday, at MetroHealth Medical Center.

MHPD learned Kappenhagen had been shopping at Giant Eagle and was putting groceries into his car when a suspect approached the victim and the two began to struggle with each other. Police said it appears the suspect shot Kappenhagen, then fled in the victim's car, which was recovered by law enforcement a short while later. The case remains under investigation with no arrests reported as of press time.

Legislation passed

The following ordinances were passed at Monday night's council meeting:

•Accepting the Ohio Public Works Commission State Capital Improvement and/or Local Transportation Improvement Funds for the Multi-Street Reconstruction & Waterline Replacement - Phase 8 Project. Shady Oak Blvd., Henry St., McCracken Rd. and E, 93 St. will have waterlines replaced, streets reconstructed and storm and sanitary sewers repaired as needed.

The city has secured loan funding for this project through the OPWC for a period of 30 years at 0% interest and will fund \$1,465,950 through the OPWC funding programs.

•Approving a Collective Bargaining Agreement between the city and the Ohio Patrolmen's Benevolent Association for a term beginning on Jan. 1, 2025, and ending on Dec. 31, 2027.

•Entering into an agreement with Viewpoint to participate in its "Discover America: Great Places to Live, Visit and Start a Business," hosted by actor Dennis Quaid, a short-form documentary series. This series will include one 3-5-minute educational segment about the city produced as a stand-alone short-form documentary to be aired nationwide on Public Television Stations, as well as a 1-minute educational commercial segment broadcast on primetime in key networks. The city will also receive one

5-6-minute corporate profile to use for its own educational or informative needs.

The contract with Viewpoint includes the stipulation that \$25,900 is to be paid by the city of Garfield Heights for underwriting and scheduling and a location fee of \$3,400 to shoot onsite in the continental U.S.

•Purchasing one 2025 Chevy Tahoe from Preston Chevrolet Kia for use in the Garfield Heights Police Department's vehicle fleet at a cost of \$53,763.

•Levying special assessments to the county auditor for the next tax collection as required by Ordinance 62-2024: "Cost of Garbage and Refuse Collection."

•Levying special assessments to the county auditor for the next tax collection as required by Chapter 551 - "Lot Maintenance" of the city's codified ordinances.

An ordinance to amend the "Fireworks" chapter of the codified ordinances of the city was moved to the Legislative Committee for further study. In February 2022, Governor DeWine signed House Bill 172 into law, allowing any person authorized to possess consumer-grade fireworks to discharge them on their own property or on another person's property with permission on certain designated days. House Bill 172 also allowed municipalities to restrict the dates and times that individuals may discharge consumer-grade fireworks or to impose a complete ban on them. The new legislation would impose a complete ban on the use of consumer-grade fireworks in the city of Garfield Heights.

Inaugural 'Embrace the Pace 5K' coming to Independence Aug. 23

A new 5K race is coming to Independence — the inaugural Embrace the Pace will take place on Saturday, Aug. 23, at 9 a.m., at Liberty Playground, 6363 Selig Blvd., Independence. The top adult male/female runners in each age group (chip-timed) will receive a Fat Head's growler plus a \$20 gift card. To register for the 5K or any of the Embrace the Pace races, visit: Connecting for Kids - Embrace the Pace 5K. Registration will close on Friday, Aug. 22, with no race day registration.

The \$35 registration fee for the 5K and one-mile run/walk/roll events include a donation to the city of Independence that will be used to purchase additional adapted playground equipment. The remaining proceeds benefit the free Connecting for Kids programs offered at libraries across Cuyahoga and Lorain counties as well as virtually. All 5K and one-mile participants will receive a commemorative T-shirt and draw string bag.

In addition, Embrace the Pace offers a kids' race for participants of all ages and abilities. The kids' race heats at 10 a.m., will include categories for children who use wheelchairs, walkers, gait trainers, reciprocating gait orthosis or other mobility aids. The cost to participate in the kids' race is \$15 with a T-shirt or \$5 without.

Every registered Embrace the Pace event participant will receive finisher medals and are invited, along with community members, to an after-race dance party at 10:30 a.m., with free hot dogs from the Autism Society of Greater Cleveland. The event will also feature resource tables, free kinesiology taping and a mobile sensory unit.

Connecting for Kids provides resources, support and community to families in Northeast Ohio who have children with mental health concerns, developmental delays and disabilities as well as those facing major life changes.

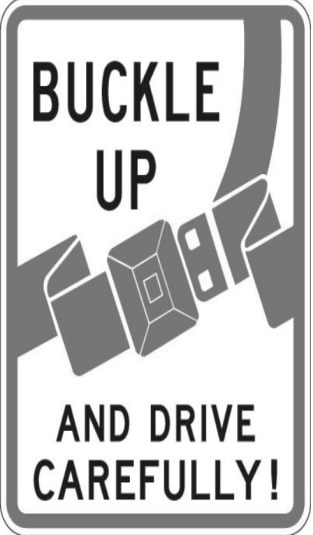

Garfield Heights

Theft

On Aug. 2, at 10:35 a.m., officers were met at the station by a woman regarding a theft. She explained to them that on the morning of July 28, she got a Facetime video call on her cell phone. The unknown party told her that there was a fraud case and instructed her to go to the bank and withdraw \$3700. Then she was told to drive around the bank building and deposit the same amount back into her account. The woman said she went to PNC Bank in Independence and did as instructed. She said she believed she was being followed as the caller knew her location and personal information. After she deposited the funds back in to her account, she realized the money was not there but had been deposited to an unknown account. She contacted PNC and a fraud case was opened. Police advised her to put an alert on her other accounts for suspicious activity. She was advised to follow up with the Detective Bureau.

Traffic Offense-Fleeing

On Aug. 2, at about 7:30 p.m., police received a FLOCK alert of a stolen Chrysler Pacifica heading north on Transportation Blvd. near I-480. Officers saw a car matching the description take a west turn onto Granger Rd. from Transportation Blvd., and saw it was occupied by what appeared to be two males. Police got behind the vehicle and attempted to conduct a traffic stop, but the car took off with police in pursuit. At about 7:35 p.m., the suspect vehicle was traveling north on Broadview Rd. approaching Pearl Rd., and went left of center and struck several vehicles in traffic which disabled the suspect vehicle. At that time two thin black males got out of the Pacifica and began running south on Pearl. After a brief foot pursuit officers were able to overtake the driver in the back parking lot of Theo's Old Brooklyn Grill at 4250 Pearl Rd. A Glock 19 handgun with an extended magazine was found laying in the middle of the sidewalk on Broadview Rd. The fleeing passenger was not apprehended. At the scene of the accident several Cleveland PD units with Cleveland EMS and Fire were assessing any victims injured. The driver GHPD had detained complained of chest pain and was transported to MetroHealth Medical Center by Cleveland EMS. He was discharged at 11:50 p.m., and taken to GHPD jail without incident. He was charged with receiving stolen property, fleeing and eluding, having weapons under disability, carrying concealed weapons, aggravated vehicular assault and obstructing official business. Detective Bureau to follow up.

Assault

• On Aug. 3, at 11:30 p.m., an officer went to the station lobby to take a report of an alleged assault that took place on Orme Rd. The victim told the officer that about an hour and a half ago he had been driving for Lyft when he picked up approximately 12 juveniles from Euclid, Ohio. He took them to the area of the 12900 block of Orme Rd., but at the residence the juvenile refused to pay the driver the promised \$40 tip. One of them threw a shoe at the driver, knocking his phone out of the car and onto the ground, breaking the screen on impact. He recovered his phone and as he was standing up, he was punched in the back of the head by one of the juveniles. Victim has dash cam footage of the individuals inside his vehicle. Report forwarded to the Juvenile Detective Bureau.

• On Aug. 4, at 10:15 p.m., police arrived in the area of the 4900 block of E. 109 St., for a report of shots fired and juveniles fighting. Officers stopped two vehicles, a Chevy Malibu and Hyundai Sonata, involved in the fighting which had a total of nine people inside them. Police had every person in both vehicles exit and sit on the sidewalk. Officers were given permission to search the Malibu and found a handgun under the floormat of the rear passenger floorboard. The juvenile who was seated there was placed in handcuffs and put in the back of a police cruiser. An officer noted that the gun was real but it was missing pieces which made it inoperable, so it could not have been the firearm involved in the "shots fired" aspect of the call. The juvenile was released to his mother on scene. The other juveniles said they were not involved in the alleged shooting and said the car that was causing the issues was already gone. All juveniles were released on scene as well. Charges pending through the Juvenile Detective Bureau.

• On Aug. 10, at 2:48 a.m., officers responded to Aries bar, 4619 Warner Rd., for a 911 call reporting people arguing and shots being fired in the parking lot. On arrival police found nobody in the parking lot or anywhere else outside the bar, but many cars were still parked in the lot, all unoccupied. Security came out and told officers everything was fine inside and they had not heard gunshots. While checking the lot police found five 9mm shell casings in the west end of the parking lot near the sidewalk on Warner Rd. They also found a small white purse containing only a driver's license and a set of keys on the sidewalk closer to the bar entrance. At that time no

victims or damage was found.

At 2:58 a.m., GHPD dispatch received a call from a Cleveland woman who said her car was just recently shot at and damaged as she was leaving Aries bar on Warner. An hour later she drove her car to the GHPD station to make a report. She told the officer there that she had driven to Aries earlier in the night and pulled into the parking lot. She said she never even got out of the car before five females came over to her car and starting punching her in her head and face by opening her doors and reaching in through her open windows. She recognized two of the females but the other three were unknown to her. She said she was able to drive away as she was being assaulted and that is when a different female started shooting at her car and struck her rear window with a bullet causing it to shatter. The victim initially stated she was alone in her car during the incident, but later said her boyfriend was in the car with her and said three of the suspect females were relatives of her boyfriend. Officers checked the victim's vehicle in the GHPD parking lot and observed damage all over the vehicle. The rear window appeared to be recently shattered with broken glass still inside the car. The report was referred to the Detective Bureau and prosecutor.
